

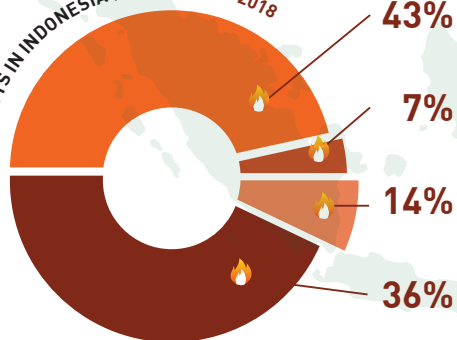
THE WINDING JOURNEY TO PEAT RESTORATION

Findings from Field Analysis of 2018 Forest Fires in Restoration Areas



Despite ongoing restoration efforts, many hot spots and forest fires have flared up in peatland areas, especially in restoration priority and permit moratorium areas. A number of hot spots and fires have also occurred in company concession areas.

14% in priority restoration areas not included in the moratorium

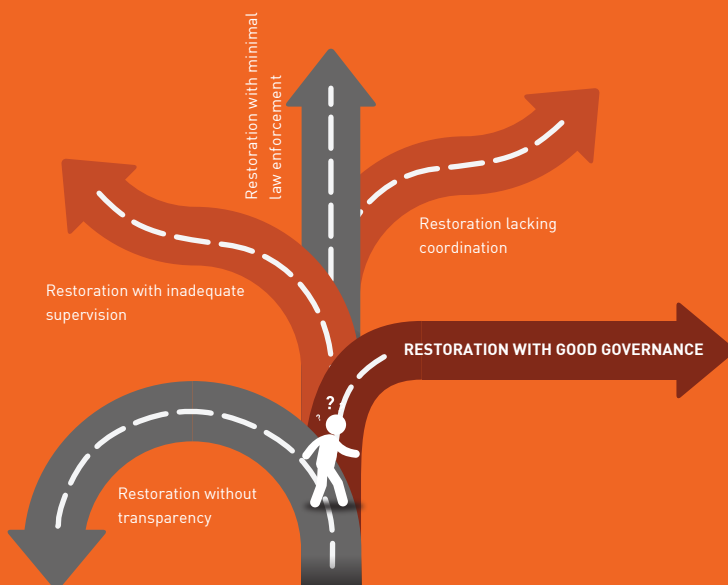
36% in moratorium areas not prioritized for restoration
